The community is opening up, society is changing for the better, slowly, but progress is visible, people understand what we face and support our rights. And this is not just me saying this, we see it in the Barometer of Opinion on the

LGBT+ Community in Romania 2023, where:

- 70% of Romanians would accept their child if they found out they had a different sexual orientation
- 69% of Romanians believe that LGBTQI+ people contribute to the well-being of society, with 61% agreeing in rural areas
- 58% of Romanians think that things would not change or would go in a positive direction if gay marriages were legalised

Unfortunately we are still witnessing various types of discrimination, an area of aggressive extremism, but this does not change what we are doing. But the good news is coming from the area of organisations, both in the professional world and in the academic world or simply in the community where we live.

About Us

MozaiQ is a community organization that is directed at LGBTQIA+ people living in Romania. MozaiQ aims to develop the LGBTQIA+ community in Romania through solidarity and mutual trust resulted from social activities, presence on the alternative cultural scene, as well as providing special attention to various groups in the community: Roma LGBTQIA+ people, trans people, HIV+ people, sex workers, LGBTQIA+ people finding themselves in a precarious socio-economic situation, people with different abilities, as well as seniors and young people.

Purpose

Strengthening, supporting and representing LGBTQIA+ communities (lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, queer, intersex, asexual) living in Romania through programs meant to meet their needs.

Mission

Improving the quality of life of LGBTQIA+ people living in Romania, protecting, supporting and promoting their rights and freedoms, thus ensuring that they can enjoy it fully and without discrimination from participation in key areas in society, family and community life, education, health, culture, the labor market and political participation.

Vision

A society in which LGBTQIA+ people participate actively, openly and visibly to social, political, economic and cultural life, and their needs are addressed through appropriate policies and services, for them to enjoy respect and acceptance in their communities and within society as a whole.

Mircea graduated in economics at ASE and in the Netherlands at the Universiteit van Amsterdam, 4 years work experience in financial auditing and 4 years in financial analysis and planning. He has the experience of having been on the board of a non-governmental organization with over 6000 members, branch president in the same organization and censor of MozaiQ in the 2019-2021 term.



Robert Rațiu - Member

I want more representation and visibility for the LGBTQI+ community in Romania. MozaiQ is an organisation that has grown enormously in recent years and there is a need to strengthen the LGBTQI+ movement in Romania together, especially in the context of the attacks coming on our community from several conservative groups.

István Téglás - *Member*

I'm an actor and I recently came out as a gay man, a gesture that for me is extremely important, because it means ensuring our visibility, showing that we exist throughout society, in different areas, contributing to the common good. I think there is still a great need for this approach to society, as for decades we have been hidden as a result of the criminalisation of homosexuality through Article 200.

I have over 15 years of experience in project management and advocacy in human rights organisations. I worked for more than 11 years in Romani CRISS - Roma Centre for Social Intervention and Studies, where I also trained as a professional, focusing on Roma minority rights. I have mainly coordinated projects in the field of education (fighting school segregation, promoting diversity, legislative changes), anti-discrimination campaigns and projects for young people (Roma and non-Roma), community development.



Tudor Kovacs - Member

Tudor Kovacs' career has focused on education, empowerment and the rights and health of the LGBTQI+ community in Romania and internationally. Between 2005 and 2023, he first worked at Population Services International (PSI) in Romania, where he led the national HIV prevention and support programme for men who have sex with men. He then worked as Executive Director at the Eurasian Coalition on Male Health (ECOM) network of organisations, and later as Programme Manager at IGLYO -International Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer and Intersex Youth and Student Organisation.

Mihai Lixandru - Member

For over 18 years I have been involved as an activist in the HIV sphere, where I have developed and professionalized. I have extensive expertise in the general health sphere with a focus on HIV and sexually transmitted infections and working with vulnerable groups. Almost 6 years ago I created the first testing centre in Romania exclusively for men who have sex with men and trans people, called Checkpoint ARAS. Today we are talking about a network of testing centres in Bucharest, Cluj, Iasi and Timisoara and soon a PrEP clinic, all part of the Checkpoint ARAS. Network.

Vlad Viski Executive Director

LGBT feminist activist and PhD candidate in Political Science at the University of Bucharest. He pursued his Master's studies at the Central European University, with a degree in Political Science. He previously graduated from California State University, Los Angeles, with a degree in Political Science. He also attended courses at University of Tel Aviv and University of Hong Kong. From 2015 to 2018 he was the president of MozaiQ.

Ana Mohr Administrative and Financial Director

As a human rights activist, Ana has been working in nongovernmental organizations for ten years; coordinated harm reduction services for sex workers, drug consumers, people living on the streets and/or people living with HIV. In 2007, Ana graduated from the Faculty of Theater at UNATC I.L. Caragiale, and in 2013, from the Risk Groups and Social Support Services Master's program.





Andrei Luca Development Director

Since 2013, after completing his undergraduate studies at the Faculty of Film, Andrei wrote cinema articles for publications such as Film Menu, Cultural Observatory, Political Art Gazette, Scena9, Sub25 or Acoperişul de Sticla. He curated queer film sections for NexT Film Festival and FAQiff. In 2017, he started a project dedicated to classic and contemporary queer film, Cineclub Queer, within which he organized several screenings with LGBTQIA+ films in Bucharest, Cluj and Iasi.



Sergiu Marinescu Director of Communication

Sergiu has been working with MozaiQ since 2018 and has been active in several non-governmental organizations. He has experience working with people with mental disabilities (within Fundacja Sprawni Inaczej in Poland), consumers of injectable drugs (within ARAS), people living with HIV (Sens Pozitiv Association), occupational therapy, HIV/AIDS information/prevention and testing as a volunteer at ARAS, diversity education and training, and art therapy.

Roxana Marin Advocacy Coordinator

Roxana is a co-founder of MozaiQ and the creator of the concept behind Unicorns@Work, with the three elements: the job fair for LGBTQIA+ individuals and inclusive employers, Unicorns at Work, the inclusive management conference of human resources Let's Walk the Talk Romania, and T-Talks – public speaking event with LGBTQIA+ people on the topic of access and experiences on the labor market.

George sought to get involved in civic activism since the beginning of his journey as a student. He volunteered in three NGOs fighting for human rights, later working in communication for Centrul de Resurse Juridice, the Pledoarie pentru Demnitate program. He studied psychology, likes to write about his feelings and experiences, to garden in his concrete apartment and to enjoy the sun as much as possible.

Programmes and Projects

Campus Pride Community advocacy campaigns for safe universities

Campus Pride is the first initiative in Romania that aims to create a welcoming, accepting and safe space for all university students in Romania. The project, dedicated to and created by LGBTI+ students, created the first safe space in which they can inform themselves, socialize, and develop their leadership abilities, in the context of a still profoundly homophobic reality. Campus Pride is the only LGBTQI+ safe space for LGBTQI+ students in Bucharest. We've organized over 100 weekly community actions in the university year since 2021.



From the formation of the Campus Pride team in October 2021 to date, we have organised over 100 community events. These have been held almost weekly on Saturdays during the academic year, with more frequent events during History Month and Pride week. Event themes have included discussion evenings, arts and crafts workshops, gender equality workshops, boardgames and more.



Together with our volunteers we organised events dedicated to young people and women from the LGBTQI+ community during Pride week. The events aimed to socialise and celebrate queer identities. Also during Pride week we curated a selection of LGBTQI+ themed publications written by people from the community for the LGBTQI+ Shelf at Cărturești. The shelf was arranged in 5 stores in Bucharest.

Campus Pride

We were the most visible organisation in LGBTQI+ History Month, organising 12 events in 4 weeks. Among them, as part of the Campus Pride program, we organized Back to University Get-Together, the reopening of the Campus Pride Bucharest center for the 2023-2024 academic year, Girls Just Wanna Have Fun, a party dedicated to women in the LGBTQI+ community, a Banner Workshop in preparation for the Our Tradition Is Love march, Rainbow Tram and Trivia Night, a trivia night about the history of the community.

As every year, the Campus Pride team was vital in organizing the annual Our Tradition Is Love march held mid-month.



Also during History Month, Campus Pride volunteers were part of an information campaign on the history of the LGBTQI+ community. They wrote texts about moments or characters from the history of the community throughout the month, resulting in 18 posts on Instagram and Facebook platforms with a reach of over 30,000.

We organised 4 workshops for associations and student groups: AS-SAS, ASLS, SCORA SSMB, Gen. Democracy Club. The topics of the workshops differed according to the profile of the associations or groups, but were focused on inclusion, diversity, equity and antidiscrimination.

We have translated the National Campus Pride Report into English to make it more accessible. We have also broadened its content by adding the Campus Pride intervention model.



Campus Pride

Campus Pride has expanded its borders to Norway and the Republic of Moldova. Together with our Norwegian partners Oslo Pride we were part of the Oslo Pride festival, addressing as part of a panel the situation of LGBTQI+ people in Romania and the results of the Campus Pride National Report. Oslo Pride paid us a visit during the Pride festival in Bucharest, being an active part in organizing multiple events, such as the Rainbow Breakfast. Together with Laolaltă Moldova partners we experienced the realities of LGBTQI+ people in Romania and the Republic of Moldova, organizing together activities in History Month (Bucharest) and Coming Out Days (Chisinau).



Campus Pride has strengthened its national presence by organising six workshops with local communities. In 2023 we reached Brasov, Constanta, lasi and Oradea, organising workshops with local associations and groups on youth community organising, anti-discrimination resources and practices.



In 2023 we also tackled LGBTQI+ cultural practices, starting a series of portraits of people who practice drag in Romania and Moldova with Laolaltă partners. We photographed and exhibited 10 portraits of 10 drag queens from the two countries at the MozaiQ Allies Gala, an exhibition that addressed the theme of Puzzling Identities.



In 2023 we selected 4 LGBTQI+ students who benefited from workshops and classes on topics such as self-advocacy, communication, community organizing and leadership, actively involving them in running Campus Pride administrative activities as well as weekly activities. The activity aims to create leaders in the LGBTQI+ student community who then take over the coordination of the Campus Pride centre, continuing the Campus Pride leadership model.

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Campus Pride

We ran a social media campaign about the experiences of LGBTQI+ students in several cities and brought to light the issues they face in their everyday lives. Topics covered included housing, discrimination in college, programming and safety in public spaces, with a reach of over 40,000.

We started support groups dedicated to LGBTQI+ youth facilitated by Ana Isac in April 2023. The groups take place every two weeks and provide LGBTQI+ youth with a safe space to discuss the most relevant issues they face and find support. Many of them come from families that do not accept them or have experienced discrimination in the education system/labour market.

FIERTE. Supporting LGBT students in Bucharest

The project aimed to replicate the Campus Pride leadership model, training 4 LGBTQI+ students in advocacy and community organizing to become actors of change in their universities, changing the climate of acceptance in the university environment.

Pride@Work

The project involved working with the Norwegian organisation Oslo Pride to exchange work experiences, institutional practices and models for organising Pride festivals.

United in Pride

The project was implemented in partnership with the association Laolaltă Moldova, aiming at exchanging best practices, highlighting similarities and increasing the capacity of LGBTQI+ youth and students from Romania and Moldova to take action.

Programme results in 2023:

- More than 500 people attended weekly events during the academic year
- Over 40 community events throughout the year
- 16 volunteers recruited for Campus Pride activities
- 4 workshops for student associations and groups
- Partnerships with 2 organisations abroad (Moldova, Norway)
- 6 workshops for local organisations in Romania
- LGBTQI+ shelf present in 5 shops in Bucharest
- Translation of the Campus Pride National Report
- A social media campaign with a reach of over 40.000
- 15 support group sessions dedicated to LGBTQI+ youth
- A leadership camp for LGBTQI+ students





Rainbow Care

MozaiQ has received an increased volume of requests from LGBTQI+ people in immediate need of assistance in recent years, which is why it realized the lack of access to psychosocial services and the need to reduce risk factors associated with unhealthy living and vulnerability in housing and the labour market. The Rainbow Care programme aims to reduce social inequalities for the LGBTQI+ community in 3 cities in Romania (Bucharest, Timisoara, Brasov) through a suite of activities that address individual community and social risk factors.



Through this programme, individual and group therapy, social and vocational counselling were offered to the most vulnerable members of the LGBTQI+ community in Bucharest, Timisoara and Brasov.



In addition, educational workshops on health topics were held focusing on the concept of individual control over personal health. Participants were guided through interactive exercises to explore the factors that support control over their own health.

MozaiQ opened the emergency shelter for community members in emergency situations. During the first months of the project, the emergency shelter underwent an improvement operation. Appropriate furniture was purchased and general cleaning activities were carried out. The people who have benefited from the services are the most vulnerable members of the LGBTQI+ community.



Rainbow Care

In addition, we organized a series of training workshops for psychosocial professionals from Bucharest, Brasov and Timisoara. The workshops were designed by the MozaiQ team as an interactive experience about diversity and inclusion, sexual orientation and gender identity, as well as life experiences and vulnerabilities specific to LGBTQI+ people, case studies and appropriate response strategies. The workshops are dedicated to specialists and providers of social, medical and other services from state institutions and professional associations. The workshop was very well evaluated by the participants who expressed satisfaction and thanks for the organisation of this activity and requested the continuation of the initiative and more similar workshops.



We created and implemented an online campaign throughout the project with a series of messages designed to support the idea of self-sufficiency and individual control over one's own health even under adverse conditions, which are the main themes of the programme.

We also organised a Rainbow Breakfast event, where we facilitated networking between members of the LGBTQI+ community and representatives from corporations and other employing institutions, with the aim of exploring employment opportunities, barriers and catalysts to employability for LGBTQI+ people in Romania.

Programme results in 2023:

- 209 hours of psychological counselling
- 15 support group sessions, of which 8 funded through Rainbow Care
- 4 trainings for professionals (two in Bucharest, one in Brasov and Timisoara)
- 1 networking event with representatives of Romanian employers
- 3 health workshops in Bucharest, Timisoara, Brasov
- 1 workshop on chemsex in Bucharest
- 1 first aid workshop in Bucharest
- Increased visibility of community support services
- Two LGBTQI+ organisations have been strengthened to provide adequate assistance
- 19 posts on MozaiQ's Instagram and Facebook pages with a reach of 48,133

Engage & Empower Advocacy campaigns for LGBTI communities

The project aimed to strengthen the capacity of local LGBTQI+ communities to influence and monitor human rights policies.

Namely, the project had three main objectives, focused on developing the advocacy capacity of 6 local LGBTQI+ initiative groups, forming a National Network, which will then have the tools to identify 3 timely advocacy themes to attract public support. Finally, we implement advocacy and communication campaigns with the aim of influencing policy makers at parliamentary, governmental and local level on human rights and the promotion of equal and fair treatment.



We mapped the needs of LGBTQI+ communities in 6 cities across the country in order to build a network of LGBTQI+ activists across Romania. The network was strengthened throughout the project through monthly meetings on relevant topics: civil partnership, simplifying procedures and protocols on legal and medical transition for transgender people, representation, visibility and combating all forms of discrimination.



Engage & Empower

In order to provide tools to activitists in the country, we organized 6 learning workshops: communication with Monica Jitariuc, public speaking with Roxana Marin, advocacy Oana Preda, direct action with Olga Popescu, community organizing and project writing with Tudor Kovacs.

As a result of the workshops and meetings, we developed the network's comprehensive Public Policy Intervention Plan, focusing on three interests: safe spaces for LGBTQI+ people in Romania, access to inclusive and dignified healthcare for transgender people and civil partnership for same-sex people.

We have developed and launched the Opinion Barometer on the LGBT+ community in Romania 2023, available on the website, with the aim to explore the perception of the general population Romania in LGBTQI+ towards people. The Barometer was conducted following gualitative and guantitative research through 6 focus groups in 6 cities across the country and a nationally representative opinion poll.

We produced and launched the Equality Index, available on the website, which contains 52 political demands of the LGBTQI+ community in Romania, contextualising the current political and social situation.



In response to the attempt of some PSD, PNL and AUR representatives to change the Law on pre-university education, we developed a mailing campaign addressed to the members of the Education Committee of the Romanian Parliament, with the aim of not approving the amendments. 174 mails were sent as a result, the law was not approved.

We organised two negotiation sessions with decision-makers at the Parliamentary Forum for Diversity, with MPs and members of civil society, and then at the second meeting, with REPER MPs, where we discussed the next steps for the creation of an inter-parliamentary group on LGBTQI+ rights in the Romanian Parliament.

An audience meeting with three representatives of the Ministry of Family, Youth and Equal Opportunities, where we asked for the amendment and completion of the application rules of the governmental loan programs "StudentInvest" and "FamilyStart", so that these programs include same-gender couples in the definition of family.

Engage & Empower

We organised the Our Tradition is Love protest in October 2023 as part of LGBTQI+ History Month. Over 1000 people shouted out their demands for the legalisation of civil partnerships and recognition of same-gender families.





We have launched the lubim la Fel Campaign, a national campaign to increase society's support for samegender civil partnerships. It integrated the efforts of many creative agencies with diverse visions. The lubim la Fel campaign was present on social media and street billboards in 5 cities across the country.

Programme results in 2023:

6 thematic sessions mapping the needs of the LGBTQ community, in 6 cities, with 84 participants

6 networking meetings in the 6 cities with 50 participants

6 workshops for the Network with a total of 87 participants

The Network's integrated intervention plan on public policies

6 focus groups with a total of 36 people in 6 cities across the country

1 nationally representative opinion survey with 1,110 valid responses

Queer în România

Queer in Romania is a research and advocacy project that aims to combat discrimination by mapping the realities of queer lives and promoting human rights by empowering community members and engaging authorities in dialogue about proposed policies. Our approach centres the community and enables its members to acquire research skills and collaborate on a data collection intervention.

The outcome of the project will be the Queer in Romania report, a report that will benefit the LGBTQI+ community as well as academics, policy actors, members of civil society and others.

In 2023 we developed the research methodology together with allies from the academic community and started mapping the experiences of queer people in Romania, covering key areas such as education, health, culture, access to jobs and housing, family life, safety in public spaces.

Within the project we professionalized 4 community members as research associates who helped with data collection. We organised 5 focus groups in Bucharest, lasi, Oradea, Brasov and Constanta.

By building a body of data and expert assessments on existing policies we aim to contribute substantially to a paradigm shift in the general attitude of the authorities regarding their responsibilities towards Romanian citizens who are part of the LGBTQI+ community and thus contribute effectively to the fight against discrimination and the strengthening of human rights in Romanian society.



We are HERE Communication campaigns for growth confidence in the NGO environment

The aim of the We Are Here project is to raise the visibility of the role and work of the LGBTQI+ non-governmental sector at national level among allies, stakeholders and the general public through three awareness and engagement campaigns over a 12-month period.

The project targets the LGBTQI+ community and its allies, and the central message is that NGOs are the foundation of democracy and direct involvement in their work generates systemic change, especially for vulnerable, minority groups.

Among the project's highlights was the Allies Gala - Pink Skies, which brought together over 250 guests from civil society, media, TV, influencers and other leaders of change who have promoted the inclusion of the LGBTQI+ community in society, either from the position of ally or community member.



Project results in 2023:

- The MozaiQ 2023 General Assembly was held and broadcast live on the MozaiQ Facebook group to ensure democratic transparency of the elections of the new Board for the period 2023-2025.
- 4 events were held within Pride 2023 and LGBTQI+ History Month 2023: Pride in the Garden - Fair of LGBTQI+ initiatives in Romania, Empowering Impact -Activism in Norway, Rainbow Tram and Guided Tour through Queer Bucharest
- We organized through Campus Pride 8 events in Brasov, Oradea, Iasi and Constanta
- A social media storytelling campaign about the lives of LGBTQI+ students in Romania
- ALLIES GALA Pink Skies, where allies from civil society, media, TV, influencers and leaders of change were present

Unicorns@work

The Unicorns@Work project aims to increase the employability of transgender people in Bucharest, working in parallel with both transgender people to improve their diverse skills and with companies, being an information space for employers and employees committed to the idea of diversity inclusion in the Romanian labour market, trans people, LGB+ people and allies of LGBTQI+ people in Romania. The project has been running since April 2019.



As part of Unicorns@Work we organised two networking events for employers and companies who want to create open, flexible and inclusive organisational cultures for LGBTQI+ people. The first event took place in July in partnership with Oslo Pride and the Norwegian Embassy in Bucharest. Together with Olso Pride's Executive Director Dan Bjorke, we explored strategies and ways in which the private sector can amplify the message about inclusion and help create a culture where diversity is valued not only within their own organisations, but also socially.



The second event was held in partnership with the French Institute and took place as part of LGBTQI+ History Month. Throughout the event we presented data from the Opinion Barometer on the LGBT+ community in Romania. Based on this x-ray of Romanian society, we started a conversation about the inclusion of LGBTQI+ people in the Romanian labour market.

Outcity

The OUTcity project aims to support LGBTQI+ people outside Bucharest, and to provide assistance to informal groups and LGBTQI+ organisations. MozaiQ works in a collaborative way with informal groups and LGBTQI+ organisations in the country, according to their needs and local realities.

We have supported Pride in Iasi, Cluj, Timisoara, Brasov and, for the first time in Romania, Oradea Pride. We have also supported local initiatives during LGBTQI+ History Month. Throughout the year we provided grants to local groups, funded capacity building courses, connected organisations and groups together, strengthened a national network, provided constant advice according to need and were continuously present in communities across the country.



Project results in 2023:

- Thematic mapping sessions on the needs of the LGBTQI+ community in 7 cities
- Informal group sessions to increase advocacy capacity
- National network building sessions
- Grants worth 23.762 RON
- Advice on legal establishment as an NGO
- One-on-one sessions on the internal functioning of organisations
- Over 10,000 kilometres travelled across the country
- Collaborative sessions with organisations and informal groups in the country on regional collaboration, future actions and existing resources


LGBTQ+ Community Fund

In 2019 we launched the LGBTQ+ Community Fund, the first fund dedicated to LGBTQI+ community initiatives in Romania. The LGBTQ+ Community Fund aims to support local LGBTQI+ community initiatives and allies to ensure safety, visibility and equality for all people in Romania, regardless of their sexual orientation, gender identity or other characteristics.

In 2023, MozaiQ distributed 59,242 RON to the community through the LGBTQ+ Community Fund:

Grants to LGBTI+ groups and organisations: 23,762 RON Legal advice: 18.470 RON Direct support for vulnerable people: 13.460 RON Retraining courses: RON 3,550





Advocacy

În January MozaiQ took a public stance on the European Court of Human Rights ruling in Fedotova and others v. Russia, in which the Council of Europe again stressed the need for European countries to recognise same-sex couples.

In the same month, the National Audiovisual Council sanctioned Romania TV for homophobic speeches in its coverage of the Tradiția Noastra E lubirea march, and in August, following a complaint from MozaiQ, the same TV station was sanctioned with a public summons.

In February, MozaiQ took a stand on a new legislative initiative proposed by two ex-AUR MPs, which would ban so-called "gay propaganda" along Putinist-Orbanist lines.

In the same month, ILGA-Europe published its annual report, which noted MozaiQ's work on Campus Pride and Unicorns@Work projects, as well as MozaiQ's signals that violence against LGBTQI+ people has increased.

On 8 March, we joined the feminist protest Our Womb is Not Your Profit, highlighting the importance of reproductive rights.

In March and April, we were actively involved in the process of adopting new education laws by:

- submitting a letter to the Ministry of Education signed by 42 civil society organisations, student associations, pupils' associations and national federations, joined by thousands of citizens, teachers, students, pupils and parents
- Signing a letter with over 100 civil society organisations to parliamentarians calling for the principles of non-discrimination in education to be upheld.
- taking a public stance in the media
- monitoring the parliamentary trail of legislative proposals
- organising a protest in Victory Square, together with other civil society organisations
- Organising a mailing campaign to MPs in the Education Committee of the Chamber of Deputies, asking them to reject the AUR amendments, which would have removed the protection of LGBT young people from the laws - over 200 citizens joined our campaign
- we fought and negotiated with MPs to keep articles on the principles of non-discrimination in education in education laws




In May, on the occasion of IDAHOBIT - International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia, we launched the Guide to LGBTQIA+ Inclusion in the Romanian Labour Market, written by our colleague Roxana Marin, at an event organized in collaboration with the Canadian Embassy in Romania, attended by dozens of representatives of the diplomatic corps and private companies.

Also in May, we welcomed the ECHR ruling in the Buhuceanu and others v. Romania case, where the Court obliges Romania to recognise same-sex couples, through a strong media presence. In September, the ECHR judgment becomes final, following the rejection of the Romanian state's application to refer the case to the ECtHR Grand Chamber, and MozaiQ is again making media appearances.

In June, July and August we joined the efforts of activists and organisations in Romania by supporting Pride festivals, both financially (through the LGBTQ+ Community Fund) and by participating in activities in Iasi, Cluj, Oradea, Brasov and Timisoara.

In June we joined the European efforts of the EU Agency for Fundamental Rights (FRA) by disseminating the 3rd edition of the LGBTIQ+ survey and questionnaire, which by July had collected around 2000 responses.

Also in June we strengthened Romanian-Norwegian relations through the participation of a MozaiQ delegation at Oslo Pride, where we met with representatives of the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ministry of Culture, as well as numerous companies from the Oslo Pride Business Forum and civil society activists.



As part of Pride Bucharest 2023, MozaiQ organised 14 events with 21 partners, gathering over 1000 participants, and our message of equality reached over 175,000 people on social media.



In July we attended the rainbow flag raising at the US Embassy, an event attended by many people from civil society, the diplomatic corps and academia, with short speeches by US Ambassador Kathleen Kavalec, Labour Minister Simina Bucura-Oprescu and members of the LGBTQI+ community.

In August, MozaiQ launches the English translation of the Campus Pride National Report.



In September we organised the United in Pride Leadership Camp, bringing together young activists from Romania and the Republic of Moldova to increase their knowledge of community activism and coalition building tactics.

In October, as part of LGBTQI+ History Month, MozaiQ hosts a Parliamentary Forum attended by several MPs from the current legislature, organizes an advocacy workshop with Oana Preda, and organizes the annual Our Tradition Is Love protest march, which gathered over 1000 participants.

In total, during LGBTQI+ History Month we organised over 13 events, with thousands of participants from the LGBTQI+ community, civil society, politics, academia, business, putting on the agenda issues relevant to the community. During the same month, we also ran an online campaign, bringing to light stories from our history near and far.



In October, MozaiQ is launching the Queer in Romania project, which involves collecting data and analysing the social, cultural, legal and economic context of the LGBTQI+ community in Romania, through a report that is intended to be replicated in the future.

Also in October we joined the housing movement and the feminist movement by participating in public protests and by standing in solidarity with other entities on issues relevant to these movements. October was also the culmination of our work to negotiate the hosting of the annual ILGA Europe conference in Bucharest in 2024 by announcing the host city at the Ljubljana Conference in Slovenia.

The first day of November started with the launch of the #lubimLaFel Campaign, the largest and most robust campaign promoting same-sex civil partnerships in Romania. The campaign was the result of a collective effort, involving dozens of creative, media and advertising agencies, as well as dozens of allies and friends of the LGBTQI+ community who agreed to get involved pro-bono in the campaign. Numerous billboards were displayed as part of the campaign, in several cities across Romania, reaching over 2 million impressions, and over 70 campaign visuals were posted on social media, as well as 3 video spots. Also in November, we launched the Barometer of opinion on the LGBT+ community in Romania 2023, an initiative that aims to survey the attitudes of Romanians on LGBT+ issues and which we hope will become a tradition.



At the beginning of November, in the context of a national scandal regarding the referendum for the family and the positioning of Elena Lasconi, mayor of Câmpulung, MozaiQ took a stand in a press release, asking the political class to urgently legalize civil partnerships.

Also in November, we organised the second edition of the LGBTQI+ Allies Gala, an event attended by over 250 people from the community, celebrities and influencers, allies, friends and members of MozaiQ. The Gala awarded personalities who have contributed to the promotion of LGBTQI+ issues in Romania and Moldova.




In mid-November, MozaiQ launched a campaign on the Family Start programme of the Ministry of Family, drawing attention to the fact that the programme discriminates against same-sex couples. To this end, we submitted a letter to Family Minister Natalia Intotero, issued a press release and held a negotiation meeting with representatives of the Ministry.

Throughout the year, MozaiQ also carried out other advocacy activities, including strengthening a partnership between Campus Pride and the Gender and Democracy Student Club of the Faculty of Political Science of the University of Bucharest, promoting online materials on relevant community days (World HIV Day, Trans Victims Commemoration Day, etc.), constantly posting on international LGBTQI+ news, promoting LGBTQI+ artists and more.




Evoluție venituri (albastru) și cheltuieli (roșu) 2015-2023, lei


